# FROM THE CANTOR

I listened recently to a recording of a lecture given a few years ago by the director of one of America's august national institutes on a subject

of great importance to everyone's well being. Now, I am not referring to the prestigious National Institutes of Health in Washington, DC, nor to the respected National Institute of Justice, also located in the nation's capital, but rather, to the relatively unknown National Institute for Play, situated in Carmel Valley, California, which describes itself as "committed to bringing the unrealized knowledge, practices, and benefits of play into public life," and which seeks to help "deliver the transformative power of play to all segments of society." Dr. Stuart Brown, a physician who directs the institute, discussed in his lecture the vital role of play, which he argues, is not just important for children, but is crucial as well for adults of all ages, conferring health and survival benefits that are significant. Research, he maintains, shows that play activities stimulate key areas of the brain, and foster the maintenance of "beginner's mind" – the ability to see things in fresh and new ways, helping us find creative solutions to the challenges we face.

That play is important should come as no surprise, as most of us at some point were taught the saying: "All work and no play makes Jacob a dull boy." Now, I don't believe for a minute that the many problems we face in life are due solely to our inability to engage adequately in fun and games. In fact, a case may be made that many of our problems are actually the result of too much fun and games and not enough serious attention to more weighty matters. But I certainly concede that a life that is excessively skewed away from play is not ideal. The lack of proper balance will likely have serious consequences.

Even our Jewish tradition recognizes this. Attending yeshiva as a young child, I remember well the constant admonition from the rebbes about not wasting time from Torah study—"bitul Torah" it was called, a very serious sin indeed. But even they understood the importance of letting us out for a daily period of recess during which we would play at punchball, dodgeball or baseball cards, a time to unwind from the demands of the classroom and learn to interact with others through

games and play. And then, of course, there has always been Purim, the quintessential opportunity to let loose with fun, games, and even a little irreverence with regard to those we are taught to revere.

Is there enough play in your life? In our highly complex, high-pressured existence, do you desire to just put on a mask and costume and play at being someone else for a few hours? Well then, be creative, and join us at the TBO/BT Purim Party on Saturday evening, March 19 at 7:30 pm. There will be food, ice cream, a Megillah reading, and yes, a great opportunity for play. I believe it will be just what the good Dr. Brown ordered!



## SISTERHOOD PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Shalom Chaverim,

This coming month is Purim, and rather than tell the story of Purim, in deference to Dr. Kahn, who spoke

about not trivializing the Holocaust, I share with you a story I found of Purim in one of the concentration camps.

The following is excerpted and reprinted from <a href="https://www.jweekly.com">www.jweekly.com</a>

"But it's Purim today!" I exclaimed. "We have to organize a minyan. Maybe we'll even remember a few verses of Megillah Esther!"

I suddenly forgot my pain, my suffering, my hunger pangs. Summoning up all my remaining strength, I went to wash my hands and face and then to find some others to complete our minyan.

Perhaps, I thought, I might even find someone else who could recall a few more verses from the Megillah so that we could fulfill as much as possible of the Jewish obligation handed down from generation to generation.

And then, as if to show that God particularly desires Jews to perform mitzvot with true dedication, a small miracle occurred: A copy of the second book of the Bible, with the complete Megillat Esther appended, was discovered by my friend, Itche Perelman, a member of the camp burial squad.

Our elation was immeasurable! Such a find was awesome! It could only be a sign that our prayers had been received in heaven and the redemption was about to begin. Our excitement grew to a feverish pitch.

Who remembered the hunger, the cold, the filth, the degradation? No one gave a thought to the dangers involved in organizing a minyan and reading the Megillah, to the possibility of the Germans or a kapo deciding to drop in on our hut. Even the nonreligious ones who only yesterday had scoffed at the "crazy Chassidim" were filled with excitement at this great event.

"Who will read the Megillah?" someone asked.

The lot, so to speak, fell on me, for I had become an adept reader of holy texts over the time I had been locked into the ghetto. Within moments, volunteers managed to locate some clothing for me since, like the other inmates of the infirmary, I had been assigned nothing more than a blanket with which to cover myself.

And so, I found myself sitting on the edge of my piece of wooden plank, dressed in a camp uniform, a towel wrapped around my head in place of a yarmulke, reciting with my remaining strength, "and Haman sought to destroy all the Jews."

When I read aloud about Haman's downfall, and that "the Jews had light and happiness, joy and honor," the spark of hope deep inside every Jew's heart ignited into a flaming torch.

"Dear Lord of the Universe," I know each of us was thinking, "make a wondrous miracle for us, too, as you did for our forefathers in those days, and let us too see the end of our enemies!"

When I finished, everyone cheered. For a brief instant, the dreadful reality of the death camp had been forgotten, all the hunger and suffering had receded. Having exerted all my remaining energy in my reading of the Megillah, I sat breathless, but with my spirit soaring.

Instead of dwelling on the past or bemoaning the present, we began to dream about the future, to hope that soon the German demon would inherit his own downfall and that the end of Jewish suffering would arrive. And like a river overflowing its banks, the festive atmosphere and the vision of redemption burst out of the broken hearts of the camp inmates, and, one mitzvah leading to another, more acts of spiritual heroism followed.

Someone decided to forgo a small piece of yesterday's bread he had saved and offered it to his comrade instead. Another person made a gift of a piece of potato, and these two "portions," which only yesterday could have caused envy and hatred among friends, now became the means by which the inmates could fulfill the Purim mitzvah "of sending gifts of food, one person to another."

These precious mishloach manot were passed around from one to the other, until they finally landed on my lap. Everyone decided that I should be the one to keep them in the end.

We are busy preparing the Shalach Mones baskets. We appreciate all the participation in our Shalach Mones fundraiser. The forms were in the last bulletin.

January was quite the busy month. Upon returning home to Israel from my awesome vacation in the States, I had very little time to settle back in. Just 3 days after landing, Nativ was off on "Israel Experience" week. We had options to choose from to give us a new look at Israel, such as an archaeological dig or volunteering in Haifa. I chose to participate in Gadna, a week of Israeli army training. It was certainly challenging, but I learned so much. Not just about commands in the field, how to build a temporary fort, and how to shoot an M16 (9 out of 10 bullets on the target ©), but also about the values of the Israeli army. Our group, or "tzevet", took part in many activities and had responsibilities, such as cleaning different parts of the

army base, and we even won the squad-wide challenge, earning ourselves the title of best tzevet of the whole squad! It was a very intense week. The next week was right up there too. All of Nativ came back together for the first time since vacation for the "Israel Today Seminar". We spent the next week going on day trips covering Israel's current state of affairs on many issues and in certain aspects of life. Options included: Israeli Society, Israeli Politics, High Tech in Israel, Old and New in Yafo, and many others. I participated in a day on Israeli life, one on Israeli Arts and Culture, and a third on Israel and the Environment. It was a fascinating week that was educational but also fun and exciting. Every day was something different. We wrapped up our packed month with a 6-day tiyul through the Negev. We spent our days hiking in places such as Ein Gedi, Nachal Gov, and Har Shlomo (with a beautiful view of Eilat, Jordan, and Egypt). We spent a Shabbat together on Kibbutz Ketura, where we participated in Desert Art workshops. The rest of the week was filled with adventures in Bedouin tents, riding camels, and living it up in Eilat. After such a busy month, we were all quite ready to get to our new homes. We said our goodbyes to our friends who were headed for Carmiel and Yerucham, already making plans to visit each other, and left for our kibbutz. After a few hours on the bus, we arrived at our new home, Kibbutz Ein Tsurim. We've now been working for almost two weeks, and personally, I've never been happier in my life. The atmosphere is wonderful and homey, the people are great, and I absolutely love my job. While it may not be the cleanest job on kibbutz, my days in the refet (dairy) are always exciting! I'm learning how to look after baby calves, herd cows, and milk them. We even witnessed the birth of a calf last week. Life on kibbutz is like nothing else.


